The new theme was French provincial.

When the Krojewskis bought the house in 1982, they remodeled to achieve the look of a bed and breakfast from out East. In their extensive renovation, the Krojewskis found some bones. Those were given to the proper authorities, who decided they were human bones, probably of a Native American.

The Krojewskis were told the house was built on or near the Indian burial ground and that Chief Sashabaw was buried near the lake on their property. They, as well as previous owners, say they have felt the presence of spirits. The Krojewskis don't mind as long as the spirits are quiet and cause no trouble.

Waterford has many old homes with wonderful stories to tell.

# House has a few skeletons—and more—in closets Article by Joy Smith

One of the more interesting aspects of working with the Waterford Historical Society is having a homeowner come to us with the history of her house. One such homeowner visited with us and presented a program to the society on one of our Thursday night meetings.

Karen Krojewski opened her presentation with the fact that her house may be part of the original homestead of Oliver Williams, founder of Waterford, along with Captain Archibald Phillips and Alpheus Williams. The latter of the two continued on to homestead on the Clinton River where it crosses over Dixie Highway. Oliver Williams settled on Silver Lake.

This information was quite exciting since Williams came here in 1819. Another intriguing fact stated by Krojewski was the house was believed to be haunted by Chief Sashabaw. The Krojewskis researched the history of their house through Oakland County records, talking to people who had lived there or lived near by.

It was first mentioned in the records in 1915 as being purchased by Harry Stowell. At that time it was a small two-room cabin with a stone fireplace for heating and cooking.

When Stowell died, the house was left in the possession of a minor, James Fredrick Smith, who was almost swindled into selling it for \$1. Helen Fader, guardian of James F. Smith, sold it in 1935 to Archie G. Baun and Helen Baun for \$1,500.

From here, dates get a bit confusing. There are two recordings of selling the house, one in 1936 and one in 1940, to Stanley Brock. The Brocks added on to the cottage and made it into a summer home. They owned the house from 1936?-40? To 1955.

Rumors have it, during that time there was a "blind pig" in the basement. Statements such as "having stumbled out of that basement more than once " made by others lead them to believe this to be true. Other evidence could be the commercial art deco cherry wood bar, built during the time of Prohibition, that occupied the basement complete with orange and black swivel bar stools bolted into the floor. The back splash mirror was beveled, set in carved cherry wood with tiered shelves for liquor bottles. A cash register and built-in cash drawer along with many empty bottles found in the renovation of the basement also leaves little doubt in their minds that "bootlegging" may have been going on in the residence. Many flat "bootlegging" bottles were also found.

The next door neighbor's home was a garage and general store with live-in quarters. His basement has a tunnel that goes out to the lake. Bootlegged booze may have come into the blind pig this way.

The house was sold again in 1994 to Mr. and Mrs. Theodor Schroder for \$15,000. The Schroders were related to Dan Blocker, one of the stars on the TV show "Bonanza".

The house was designed for large parties. Rumor has it Schroder had his own agenda. The house told this story during renovation. A box of receipts for dinners and flowers sent to someone other than his wife was found, as were paycheck receipts showing his take home pay as \$350 (back in 1952).

Schroder ran the Pontiac Foundry. He contracted the work for the cement boathouse on the property. When told two dwellings on one piece of property were not allowed, Schroder had the boathouse built in one weekend. Cinder blocks are still found in the lake where they were hastily thrown.

Schroder left the house and his wife, but she loved it there so much she tried to keep it up herself. She ran it as a boarding house for her much needed income, but poor health prevented her from keeping it in good repair.

She finally had to sell it in 1977 to the Boilie family for \$85,000. The Boilies spared no expense on redecorating.
